Measuring Progress | Nationwide

Progress is incremental, but there to see

- •23,500 individuals have received literacy training (TARGET ACHIEVED).
- 4,150 people have completed vocational training (TARGET ACHIEVED).
- Job creation through infrastructure projects such as road and bridge construction in preparation for Dahla Dam project phase.
- 34 provincial offices created for the Electoral Complaints Commission.
- 95,500 tonnes of food were provided nationally between October and December 2009.

Measuring Progress | Kandahar

Progress is incremental, but there to see

- 2,105 Afghan National Police (ANP) officers received training.
- Number of completed schools now at 14 with 28 more under construction.
- In October, November and December 2009, more than 376,000, 386,000 and 391,500 children respectively were vaccinated in Kandahar province.
- Courses were provided to 731 health care workers in order to contribute to increased access to health services (TARGET ACHIEVED).
- More than 220,000 people have received mine-risk education (TARGET ACHIEVED).

Measuring Progress | Kandahar Economic Growth

Progress is incremental, but there to see

- Employment footprint spans programming in all priority areas.
- 70% of identified communities in key districts have completed infrastructure projects.
- Loans were provided to over 1,100 clients (TARGET ACHIEVED).
- •1,100 small- and medium-sized new businesses registered in Kandahar province.
- Recent poll indicates that 52% of Kandaharis polled are satisfied with provision of education and 46% with employment employment opportunities.
