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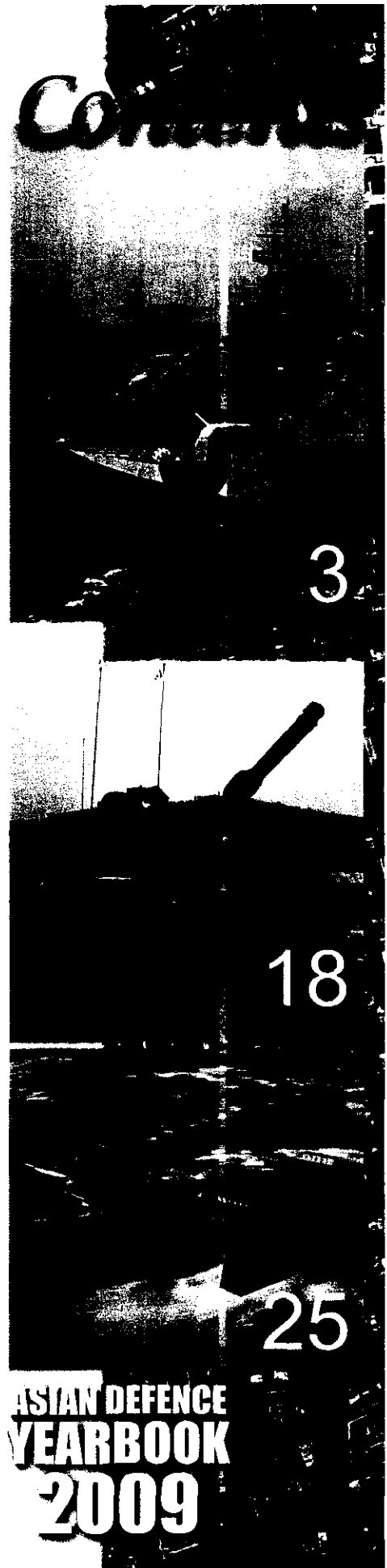
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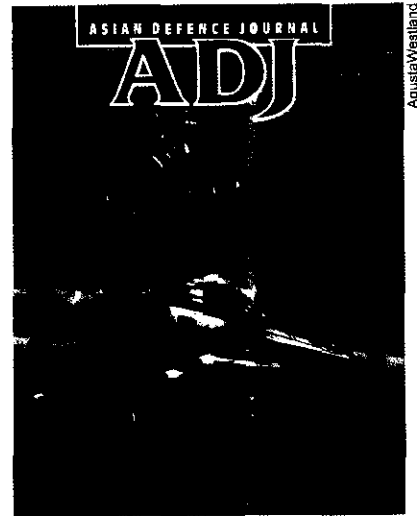
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COVER: This month's cover depicts two versions of AgustaWestland's AW159 (formerly Future Lynx) multi-role helicopter. The helicopter will be the UK Royal Navy's new maritime surveillance and attack helicopter and the British Army battlefield surveillance helicopter. The AW159 is based on the current production version, the Super Lynx 300, which has an improved airframe and a new engine. Designated as the Lynx Wildcat in UK military service, the AW159 also has an increased payload and an advanced avionics suite. The first flight of the aircraft is on schedule to take place in November 2009.

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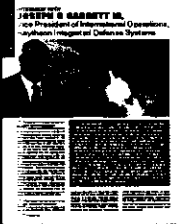
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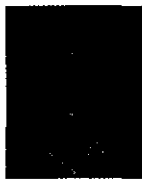
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
