

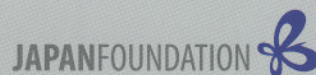

Alain AESCHLIMANN, Mr

Head of Operations for East Asia, South-East Asia and the Pacific, The International Committee for the Red Cross (ICRC), Switzerland

He is currently ICRC Head of Operations for East Asia, Southeast Asia and the Pacific, and is based at the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland. He has a law degree from the University of Neuchâtel/Switzerland and has had a diverse career with ICRC.

Some of his appointments include Deputy Head of Delegation in Angola (1989-1990) and Peru (1991-1992), Head of Delegation in Iraq (1992-1993), Coordinator for Legal Advisors to the Operations at ICRC Headquarters (1993-1996), Deputy Head of the Detention Division at ICRC Headquarters (1996-1997), Deputy Head of Central Tracing Agency and Protection Division at ICRC Headquarters (1997-1998), Head of Delegation in Israel, the occupied territories and Palestinian autonomous territories (1998-2000), Head of Delegation in Ethiopia (2000-2003) and Head of Central Tracing Agency and Protection Division at ICRC Headquarters (2003-2008).



Robert AYSON, Prof Dr

Director, The Centre for Strategic Studies, Victoria University of Wellington, New Zealand

He is Professor of Strategic Studies and directs the Centre for Strategic Studies in the School of Government of Victoria University of Wellington. From 2002 to 2009 he directed the Master's programme in the Australian National University's Strategic and Defence Studies Centre. Professor Ayson has also held academic positions with Massey University and the University of Waikato, and official positions with the New Zealand government. Professor

Ayson completed his PhD in War Studies at King's College London as a Commonwealth Scholar and an MA at the ANU as a New Zealand Defence Freyberg Scholar. Having written on the work of the American strategist Thomas Schelling, he is now writing a book on the ideas of Hedley Bull. He is also part of a MacArthur Foundation-funded research project on regional security with a particular emphasis on arms control in Asia.



Desmond BALL, Prof Dr

Strategic & Defence Studies Centre (SDSC) Australian National University

He was Head of the Centre from 1984 to 1991. Professor Ball is the author and editor of more than 50 books and monographs on technical intelligence subjects, nuclear strategy, Australian defence, and security in the Asia-Pacific region. His recent publications include *Australia and Cyber-warfare* (co-authored with Gary Waters and Ian Dudgeon); *Militia Redux: Or Sor and the Revival of Paramilitarism in Thailand* (co-authored with David Mathieson); *The Boys in Black: The Thahan Phran (Rangers), Thailand's Para-military Border Guards*; *Strategy and Security in the Asia-Pacific* (co-edited with Robert Ayson) and numerous articles on issues such as the strategic culture in the Asia-Pacific region and defence acquisition programmes in the region. Professor Ball was elected a Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences of Australia (FASSA) in 1986. He served on the Council of the International Institute for Strategic Studies (IISS) in 1994-2000, and was Co-chair of the Steering Committee of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific (CSCAP) in 2000-2002.

Aileen San Pablo BAVIERA, Prof

**Visiting Senior Fellow, S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies
Nanyang Technological University & Centre for Asian Studies,
The University of the Philippines**

She was recently also Visiting Fellow of the Australian Research Council's Centre of Excellence in Policing and Security, on joint appointment by the Australian National University and Griffith University. She is Professor of Asian Studies and formerly Dean at the Asian Center, University of the Philippines. She is also editor-in-chief of the journal *Asian Politics and Policy* published by the Policy Studies Organization and Wiley-Blackwell. Her research interests include contemporary China, East Asian regional security – with particular focus on maritime affairs, territorial disputes, and regional security architecture – and civil society in Asia. Dr. Baviera lectures regularly at the Foreign Service Institute and the National Defense College of the Philippines. Overseas, she has held visiting fellowships at various universities. From 1999-2001, she was a member of the East Asia Vision Group, a committee designated by East Asian governments to prepare a vision document for the ASEAN Plus Three. She holds a PhD in Political Science, an MA in Asian Studies, and a Bachelor of Science in Foreign Service, all from the University of the Philippines. She does volunteer work as a Trustee of the non-profit human rights organization, Economic, Social, Cultural Rights-Asia.



John BRANDON J., Mr

Director, International Relations, The Asia Foundation, USA

He is also the associate director of the Foundation's Washington, D.C. office. In 2004 and 2008, Mr. Brandon managed the Foundation's quadrennial "America's Role in Asia" project, which examines US-Asian relations in-depth, and made recommendations on US policy. Mr. Brandon's other responsibilities include monitoring US policy toward the Asia-Pacific region and managing programme activities in Washington. In 2007-2008 he participated in the Stanley Foundation project on "New Power Dynamics in Southeast Asia." A Southeast Asia specialist by training, Mr. Brandon's opinion pieces on the region have appeared in *The International Herald Tribune*, *The Christian Science Monitor*, *The Los Angeles Times*, and other newspapers around the United States. He is the editor of *Burma/Myanmar towards the Twenty-First Century: The Dynamics of Continuity and Change* (New York: Open Society Institute, 1997) and a contributor to *Burma: Prospects for a Democratic Future* (Washington, D.C.: The Brookings Institution, 1998). Mr. Brandon received his B.A. in history from Drew University and M.A. in political science and Southeast Asian studies from Northern Illinois University.



Brahma CHELLANEY, Dr

Centre for Policy Research, India

He is a professor at the independent Centre for Policy Research in New Delhi, and the author of the just-published book, *Water: Asia's New Battlefield* (Washington, DC: Georgetown University Press, 2011). His previous book, *Asian Juggernaut: The Rise of China, India, and Japan* (New York: Harper Paperback, 2010), was an international bestseller. Professor Chellaney has served as a member of the Policy Advisory Group headed by the Foreign Minister of India. Before that, he was an adviser to India's National Security Council, serving as convenor of the External Security Group of the National Security Advisory Board. As a specialist on international security issues, he has held appointments at Harvard University, the Brookings Institution, the Australian National University, and at the Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University. His scholastic articles have appeared in numerous journals, including *International Security*, *Orbis*, and *Survival*. His opinion articles have appeared in *The International Herald Tribune*, *Wall Street Journal*, *New York Times*, *Financial Times*, *The Guardian*, *Times of India*, *Hindustan Times*, *Economic Times*, and *Japan Times*. He is the author of six books.

Earlier, Mohan was Professor of South Asian Studies at the Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU) in New Delhi and the Rajaratnam School of International Studies (RSIS), Singapore. He also served as the Diplomatic Editor and the Washington Correspondent of *The Hindu*. Mohan was a member of the UN Inter-Governmental Expert Group on Peaceful Uses of Outer Space during 1991-92. He was a Jennings Randolph Peace Fellow at the US Institute of Peace, Washington DC, during 1992-93. Mohan led the Indian Chapter of the *Pugwash* Conferences on Science and World Affairs during 1999-2006. He was the Henry Alfred Kissinger Chair in Foreign Policy and International Relations at the Library of Congress, Washington DC during 2009-10. His recent books include *Crossing the Rubicon: The Shaping of India's New Foreign Policy* (New York: Palgrave, 2004); *Impossible Allies: Nuclear India, United States and the Global Order* (New Delhi: India Research Press, 2006); and *Power Realignments in Asia: China, India and the United States*

**Chairman, Board of Directors,
The Cambodian Institute for Cooperation and Peace (CICP), Cambodia**

He is also a Member of Parliament of the Kingdom of Cambodia. His political career began in 1971 when he joined the Paris-based royalist movement, GRUNC/FUNK (Gouvernement Royal d'Union Nationale du Cambodge/United National Front of Kampuchea). In 1981, he joined the National United Front for an Independent, Neutral, Peaceful and Cooperative Cambodia (FUNCINPEC) and in 1988, left France for Thailand where he was appointed Chief of FUNCINPEC's Humanitarian Department. On Nov 7, 1991, he returned to Cambodia for the first time in 20 years, and, as Chief Survey Mission on behalf of Prince Norodom Ranariddh, was in charge of laying the groundwork for FUNCINPEC's participation in the electoral process, mandated under the Paris Peace Agreement, in advance of the UN's 18-month Mission in Cambodia. In May 1993, as FUNCINPEC's Bureau Chief in Phnom Penh, Prince Norodom Sirivudh helped his party to its elections victory, after which he was appointed Co-Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs.

**Faculty of Political Science, Chulalongkorn University
& Senior Fellow, Institute of Security and International Studies, Thailand**

He also serves as President of the Political Development Council, an independent organization established pursuant to the Constitution of the Kingdom of Thailand. Previously, from October 2006 to January 2008, Suchit was a member of the National Legislative Assembly and served as a Justice of the Constitutional Court from February 2000 to December 2004. He held positions as both Professor and Dean of the Faculty of Political Science, Chairman of ISIS Thailand, Vice-Rector of Student Affairs of Chulalongkorn University, Deputy Dean for Academic Affairs and head of Department of Government, Faculty of Political Science, Chulalongkorn University. SUN Zhe, Prof Dr

Director, Center for U.S.-China Relations, Tsinghua University, China

He is considered one of the leading scholars in the field of American Studies and US-China Relations in China. Prof Sun is also an adjunct professor at the College of Foreign Affairs in Beijing, Southwest Political and Legal Affairs University in Chongqing, and the PLA Foreign Language University in Luoyang. Prior to that, between 2000 and 2007, he was professor and deputy director of the Center for American Studies at Fudan University. Professor Sun has also taught at the East Asian Institute, Columbia University and Ramapo College, New Jersey. Professor Sun is the author and editor of more than 20 books on comparative politics and US-China relations. He is a graduate of Fudan University and has a PhD in Political Science from Columbia University.



SURIN Pitsuwan, HE Dr

Secretary General, Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN)

He was a Member of the Thai Parliament in 1986 and has served in the same constituency for seven consecutive terms. In 1986, he was appointed Secretary to the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Subsequent appointments were as Assistant Secretary to the Minister of Interior in 1988 and Deputy Foreign Affairs Minister from 1992-1995. He was the Minister of Foreign Affairs from 1992-2001. He is currently a member of the Commission on the Social Dimension of Globalization, and Member of the International Advisory Board of the Council on Foreign Relations, besides being a member of various other boards and councils. He was also a member of the 'Wise Men Group' under the auspices of the Henri Dunant Centre for Humanitarian Dialogue (HDC) in Geneva, and was advisor to the peace negotiations between the Acehese Independence Movement (GAM) and the Government of the Republic of Indonesia. Dr. Pitsuwan was appointed Assistant Vice Rector for Academic Affairs at Thammasat University where he taught from 1975 to 1986. He has worked as a columnist for the Nation Review and the Bangkok Post, and as a correspondent and analyst for the ASEAN Forecast. He studied at Harvard University where he received a Ph.D. and an M.A. He received his B.A. in Political Science from Claremont Men's College in California in 1972.

RIZAL SUKMA, Dr **Executive Director,** **Centre for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS),** **Indonesia**

He is also the Chairman of the International Relations Division, Central Executive Board of Muhammadiyah (second largest Islamic organisation in Indonesia, with approximately 25 millions members). He has served as a member of the National Committee on Strategic Defence Review, Indonesia's Ministry of Defence. Dr Rizal Sukma has worked extensively on Southeast Asia's Security Issues, on ASEAN, Indonesia's Defence and Foreign Policy, and Domestic Political Changes in Indonesia. In July 2005, he was awarded the Nakasone Award for his contribution in promoting international security cooperation; he was the first Indonesian to receive the Award. Dr Rizal received his PhD in International Relations at the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE), in 1997. His recent publications include: 'ASEAN: New Challenges, New Horizons and New Targets,' in Stephen Leong, ed. *Peace in the Pacific: Confronting the Issues* (Kuala Lumpur: ISIS, 2007). His books include *Indonesia and China: The Politics of a Troubled Relationship* (London: Routledge, 1999).



SYED HAMID Syed Jaffar Albar, Tan Sri **Chairman, Land Public Transport Commission (SPAD)** **& former Minister of Foreign Affairs, Malaysia**

His foray into national politics and elected office began when he won the Kota Tinggi Parliamentary seat in the 1991 election, and at the age of 46, was appointed a full Minister in the Prime Minister's Department -- Law Minister, and the Barisan Nasional's Deputy Whip in Parliament. His first ministerial appointment was for five years and amongst his achievements were helping to reduce the backlog of cases in the courts and improving the strained relations between the legal fraternity and the judiciary after the dismissal of the then Chief Judge. His next appointments were that of Minister of Defence (1995-1999), Minister of Foreign Affairs (1999-2008) and finally Minister of Home Affairs (2008-2009). Of the many Ministerial positions he held, it was his stint at the Foreign Ministry that is most dear to him. It was an exciting period in Malaysian foreign policy history and Syed Hamid oversaw a number of significant world events that were hosted by Malaysia such as the ASEAN, OIC and NAM summits. Syed Hamid found his experiences in handling the conflicts in Bosnia and the war in Iraq as the most significant and most challenging in his political career. On the regional front, his diplomatic efforts included trying to solve the conflicts between the MNLF and the Manila government in the southern Philippines.



Hitoshi TANAKA, Mr **Chairman, Institute for International Strategy, Japan Research Institute (JRI)**

He is also a senior fellow at the Japan Center for International Exchange. He has also been a visiting professor at the Graduate School of Public Policy, University of Tokyo, since April 2006. He was Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs, Japan, until August 2005. He had previously been Director-General of the Asian and Oceania Affairs Bureau (2001-2002) and the Economic Affairs Bureau (2000-2001); Consul-General in San Francisco (1998-2000); and Deputy Director-General of the North American Affairs Bureau (1996-98). He has a BA in Law from Kyoto University and BA and MA in Philosophy, Politics and Economy from Oxford University. Mr. Tanaka has contributed articles to various newspapers and monthly magazines. His latest publications include *Purofeshonaru no Kosho-ryoku* [The Logic of Strategic Negotiation] (2009), *Gaiko no Chikara* [The Power of Diplomacy] (2009), and *Kokka to Gaiko* [The Nation and Diplomacy] (2005).

& Associate Professor, the Faculty of Law and the LKY School of Public Policy
National University of Singapore**

He is a public intellectual focusing on international and public affairs. Tay has taught at Harvard Law School and Yale University. Since 2010, he is also a senior consultant with Wong Partnership, a leading law firm based in Singapore with a regional practice. In 2010, he authored a book on US-Asia relations, *Asia Alone: The Dangerous Post-Crisis Divide from America*. Fareed Zakaria of CNN and *Newsweek International* endorsed the book, calling Simon 'one of the most intelligent and reliable guides to the region.' He has spoken at many international meetings, including the World Economic Forum (Davos). Simon has served as a Member of Parliament in Singapore. Although a reporter on political and economic issues he began a technology-oriented column for the *Journal* in 2000 and has since become a specialist in a world where media, technology and politics meet. His Singapore-based consultancy has clients ranging from Thomson Reuters to The Carter Center, whom he advises on the changing role of the media (and the rise of the social media). Commander, US Pacific Command, USA

An F-14 aviator, Willard served in a variety of west coast fighter squadrons; VF-2 4, VF-124, VF-2, and VF-51 aboard the aircraft carriers USS *Constellation*, USS *Ranger*, USS *Kitty Hawk* and USS *Carl Vinson*. He was Operations Officer and Executive Officer of Navy Fighter Weapons School (TOPGUN) and aerial coordinator for the movie. He later commanded the "Screaming Eagles" of Fighter Squadron 51. Following nuclear-power training, Willard served as Executive Officer of USS *Carl Vinson* (CVN 70), commanded the amphibious flagship USS *Tripoli* (LPH 10) in the Persian Gulf during "Operation Vigilant Warrior" for which *Tripoli* received a Navy Unit Commendation and commanded the aircraft carrier USS *Abraham Lincoln* (CVN 72). Admiral Robert F. Willard is a Los Angeles native and a 1973 graduate of the United States Naval Academy. He has a Master's Degree in Engineering Management from Old Dominion University and is an MIT Seminar XXI alumnus. Admiral Willard's decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit and various other awards.



YANG Rui, Mr.

Producer and Anchor, "Dialogue," CCTV, China

From 1968 to 1988, he worked for China National Radio as a sub-editor for world news. He joined China Central Television (CCTV) in 1988, after which he quickly became the co-host of "Focus," CCTV's first current affairs show in English. He is the producer and anchor for "Dialogue," a thirty-minute current affairs talk show which is broadcast daily from Monday through Friday. He began his college studies at the Department of International Politics of Peking University in 1981 and received his Ph.D. from Peking University in 1991. He is currently a professor at the University's School of International Studies, and Deputy Director of the Center for International & Strategic Studies (CISS) of Peking University. Dr. Zhu served as a research fellow in distinguished institutes such as the Washington-based Center for Strategic & International Studies (CSIS), Fairbank Center for East Asian Studies at Harvard University, and as a visiting scholar at Durham University in UK. 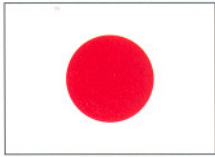
The Japan Foundation

Economic Research Institute for ASEAN and East Asia (ERIA)

ERIA is an independent international organization established on June 3rd 2008 based on an agreement between Leaders of East Asia Summit members. ERIA's major task is to conduct research works and provide policy recommendations to various ASEAN related policy meetings including the ASEAN Summit, EAS, Economic Ministers' meeting, Energy Ministers' meeting and Transport Ministers' meeting. 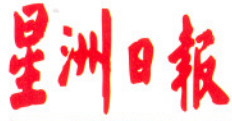

Transmitting over FM 93.9, BERNAMA Radio24, which debuted in 2007, maintains its position as Malaysia's first and only news radio station. True to its cause, the Station delivers updates every fifteen minutes, hence offering its audience nonstop news and information ahead of the TV, newspapers and the internet. Operated by the Malaysian National News Agency, the Station presents creative programming ranging from talk-back shows, documentaries, discussions and debates, business and financial counseling, quizzes and contests. With its original format, BERNAMA Radio24's music selection adds colour to its programming. The Station's playlist ranges from adult contemporary and retro pop to jazz and R&B, which makes up about 20% of its programme content. BERNAMA Radio24's programmes are delivered both in Bahasa Malaysia and English, targeting the Capital's urban, middle class population aged 30+ and focusing on PMEBS (Professionals, Managers, Executives & Businessmen). The Station currently airs in the Klang Valley but is expected to broadcast nationwide by 2011.

Established in 1929, *Sin Chew Daily* is now the leading Chinese-language newspaper in Malaysia. Operations include the Asian Centre for Media Studies, Asia News Network membership, Star RFM and Suria FM radio stations, *The Star* e-paper, *The Star* Mobile Portal and The Studio V multimedia hub. The Star's daily circulation now approximates 300,000, with more than a million readers each for *The Star*, *The Sunday Star* and *The Star Online*.
