► INTRODUCTION

The Institute of Strategic and International Studies (ISIS) Malaysia was established on 8 April 1983 as an autonomous, not-for-profit research organisation. ISIS Malaysia has a diverse research focus which includes economics, trade, regional integration, foreign policy, security studies, nation-building, social policy, technology, innovation and environmental sustainability. It also undertakes research collaboration with national and international organisations in important areas such as national development and international affairs.

ISIS Malaysia engages actively in Track Two diplomacy, and promotes the exchange of views and opinions at both the national and international levels. The Institute has also played a role in fostering closer regional integration and international cooperation through forums such as the Asia-Pacific Roundtable (APR), the ASEAN Institutes of Strategic and International Studies (ASEAN-ISIS), the Pacific Economic Cooperation Council (PECC), the Network of East Asian Think-Tanks (NEAT), the Network of ASEAN-China Think Tanks (NACT), the ASEAN-India Network of Think Tanks (AINTT), and the Silk Road Think Tank Network (SiLKS). ISIS Malaysia is a founding member of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific (CSCAP) and manages the Council's Secretariat.

As the country's premier think tank, ISIS Malaysia has been at the forefront of some of the most significant nation-building initiatives in Malaysia's history. It was a contributor to the Vision 2020 concept and was consultant to the Knowledge-Based Economy Master Plan initiative. It also produced the first ever National Interest Analysis to be undertaken on Malaysia's participation in the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP).

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE

I am pleased to present the ISIS Malaysia Annual Report 2017. The report features the activities of the Institute and provides information on the projects, published works, presentations as well as media engagement of our research staff.

ISIS Malaysia remains steadfast in its objectives of promoting independent research and serious discussions as well as providing timely policy advice on various issues of concern to the nation and the world at large. This has been well achieved through the many conferences, meetings, roundtable discussions, seminars and workshops that were organised throughout the year, some of which were done in collaboration with other local and foreign institutions. Indeed, the year 2017 has been a very eventful and busy yet fulfilling year for ISIS Malaysia.

ISIS Malaysia was involved in two projects for the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR) Malaysia in 2017. The first was a study on granting refugees permission to work from the perspectives of Malaysia's national interest and national security. The second was a study on addressing challenges and identifying opportunities for refugee access to employment in Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand.

The Institute was also commissioned by the World Bank group to research on innovation and productivity in Malaysia. Furthermore, ISIS Malaysia was invited as a participant to the ongoing SCHEMA Workshop on Urban Food Systems and Health of the United Nations University's International Institute for Global Health (UNU-IIGH). The workshop was conducted to examine the urban food systems in Malaysian cities.

ISIS Malaysia successfully convened the 31st Asia-Pacific Roundtable (APR) from 22-24 May 2017. The event, which had the full support of the ASEAN-ISIS fraternity as well as other long-time institutional partners, was declared open by The Honourable Datuk Seri Nancy Shukri, Minister in the Prime Minister's Department, on behalf of The Honourable Dato' Sri Mohd Najib Tun Abdul Razak, Prime Minister of Malaysia. The 31st APR attracted over 260 participants including ministers, policy makers, security experts, scholars, researchers, journalists and business leaders from the Asia Pacific and Europe.

A forum entitled, "Malaysia's Population in 2050: What Does This Mean Socio-Economically?" was held on 25 April 2017. The forum's notable speakers included Dr Amjad Rabi, Deputy Representative and Senior Social Policy Specialist at United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) Malaysia; Dr Muhammed Abdul Khalid, Managing Director and Chief Economist at DM-Analytics, Malaysia; and Mr Chua Choon Hwa, Undersecretary (Policy and Strategic Planning) at the Ministry of Women, Family and Community Development (KPWKM) of Malaysia.

A series of events were also organised to commemorate ASEAN's 50th anniversary. First, a symposium was held to kick off conversations on the future of the ASEAN Community. Second, the ASEAN Circle, an initiative by ISIS Malaysia and the Ministry of International Trade and Industry (MITI), was established to provide a platform for dialogue among relevant stakeholders to enhance the overall understanding and awareness of the three pillars that make up the ASEAN Community. Third, ISIS Malaysia published a book entitled ASEAN Future Forward: Anticipating the Next 50 Years. The publication was launched by HRH Paduka Seri Sultan Nazrin Muizzuddin Shah Ibni Almarhum Sultan Azlan Muhibbuddin Shah Al-Maghfur-Lah, the Sultan of Perak Darul Ridzuan and Royal Fellow of ISIS Malaysia, on 28 August 2017. The book launch event was followed by a panel discussion on issues relevant to ASEAN and its member states.

On 28 January 2017, ISIS Malaysia was honoured to host the royal visit by HRH The Regent of Kelantan, Dr Tengku Muhammad Fa-iz Petra Ibni Sultan Ismail Petra. ISIS Malaysia Board Members were also present to welcome His Royal Highness.

Through our International Affairs Forum (IIAF) series, the Institute was also able to host prominent leaders, policy makers, legislators, diplomats and scholars who spoke on a variety of subjects. These speakers included Dr Cho-Oon Khong, Chief Political Analyst at Shell International; Ms Irma Argüello, Founder and Chair of the Nonproliferation for Global Security Foundation (NPSGlobal); Dr Maria Sultan, Director-General of the South Asian Strategic Stability Institute (SASSI) University; Colonel Forrest Hare, former Air Attaché at the Embassy of the United States in Kuala Lumpur; Dr Anne Speckhard, Adjunct Associate Professor of Psychiatry and of Security Studies at Georgetown University; Mr Boris Michel, Regional Director for Asia and the Pacific at the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC); and Major General Muniruzzaman (Rtd), President and CEO of the Bangladesh Institute of Peace and Security Studies (BIPSS). Several roundtable discussions were held on various subjects, featuring speakers from different institutions and countries. ISIS Malaysia also continued to receive visitors from various entities in Malaysia and overseas.

In March and October, Prof Dr Jomo Kwame Sundaram delivered his second and third public lectures as the third holder of the Tun Hussein Onn Chair in International Studies. I would like to express my sincere thanks and deep gratitude to Dr Jomo for his intellectual and scholastic contribution as holder of the Chair and to the late Tun Hussein Onn's family and the Noah Foundation for their continuing support and generous contribution to fund the Chair.

Throughout 2017, ISIS Malaysia continued to actively engage and maintain close links with other think tanks and institutions at home and abroad. The Institute jointly hosted in Malaysia several events with think tanks and institutions from other countries. These included the New Members Strategy Meeting of the Asia-Pacific Leadership Network (APLN) for Nuclear Non-Proliferation and Disarmament, held in collaboration with the APLN Secretariat, Seoul; the First Roundtable on the Korean Peninsula: The Korean Peninsula and Regional Security, organised together with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Republic of Korea; the Launch of the

Malaysia Scholars on Korea (MASK) Network and Panel Discussion on Searching for a Malaysia-Republic of Korea Comprehensive Strategic Partnership, co-organised with the Embassy of the Republic of Korea in Malaysia; and the ASEAN-UN Regional Dialogue on "Women, Peace and Security – The Role of Women in the Prevention of Violent Extremism", convened with the support of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Malaysia and the United Nations. Two long-standing annual events were also coordinated – the Sixth Malaysian-German Security Dialogue, held in partnership with Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung (KAS), and the Tenth ASEAN-Australia-New Zealand (AANZ) Dialogue, organised jointly with Asialink and the Asia New Zealand Foundation.

Pursuant to the MOU signed with the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (CASS) in November 2015, ISIS Malaysia received a CASS delegation at its premises and hosted a Roundtable Discussion on "Malaysia's Participation in the Belt and Road Initiative: Managing the Challenges of Implementation" on 16 October 2017.

An ISIS Malaysia delegation visited Beijing and Xi'an from 3-9 September 2017 at the invitation of the Chinese People's Institute of Foreign Affairs (CPIFA). The main purpose of the visit was to convene the Third China-Malaysia Seminar. The delegation also met with scholars at the China Institute for International Strategic Studies (CIISS) in Beijing to discuss Malaysia-China relations and regional issues of concern.

ISIS Malaysia also sent a representative to participate in the 2017 Muslim Youth Exchange Camp for Southeast Asian Countries, organised by Taiwan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs, from 14-20 May 2017 in Taipei. As in the past, ISIS Malaysia's Chairman and Chief Executive and research staff attended numerous conferences, seminars and colloquia at home and abroad, including the first Belt and Road Forum (BRF) for International Cooperation in Beijing in May 2017, and the Boao Forum for Asia Annual Conference in March 2017. Research staff also participated in the Roundtable on Climate Change and the Role of ASEAN in Climate Change Politics in Yangon in June 2017; Delhi Dialogue IX on Charting the Course for India-ASEAN Relations for the Next 25 Years in July 2017; and the International Think-Tank Symposium on the 19th CPC National Congress: Implications for China and the World in Beijing in November 2017.

I wish to record here that the accomplishments attained by ISIS Malaysia would not have been possible without the support, assistance and encouragement of the Government of Malaysia and other governments as well as various individuals and organisations, public and private, here in Malaysia and abroad. I wish to express my sincere appreciation and gratitude to all our friends, associates and supporters for their invaluable assistance and generous contributions that enabled ISIS Malaysia to carry out its activities throughout the year.

I would also like to record my appreciation to the members of the Board of ISIS Malaysia for their full support and encouragement. Last but not least, I thank and commend all staff for their dedication and commitment in ensuring that ISIS Malaysia remains as the nation's premier think tank.

I look forward to continued success and greater achievements in the coming year for ISIS Malaysia.





EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

This section highlights ten major conferences, a royal visit, two public lectures, a book launch and a series of ISIS International Affairs Forums. A number of roundtable discussions were also held on our premises. Some of these meetings were closed-door discussions with visiting diplomats. Additionally, there were visits by institutions from several countries, including Bangladesh, France, New Zealand, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, Republic of Korea, the People's Republic of China, and the United States.

CONFERENCES

Asia-Pacific Leadership Network for Nuclear Non-Proliferation and Disarmament New Members Strategy Meeting

12-14 March 2017, Kuala Lumpur

Co-hosted by ISIS Malaysia and the Asia-Pacific Leadership Network (APLN), the meeting with new members was designed to forge a common understanding of how the network might best achieve its aims of informing and energising public opinion, especially high-level policy makers, to take seriously the very real threats posed by nuclear weapons, and to do everything possible to contain, diminish and eventually eliminate nuclear weapons. The meeting covered the following aspects:

ASEAN 50|50: Projecting the Future of a Community 22 May 2017, Hilton Kuala Lumpur

ASEAN 50|50 was organised by ISIS Malaysia in accordance with ASEAN's 50th anniversary celebration. The Hon Brig Gen Khairy Jamaluddin, Minister of Youth and Sports, delivered the Keynote Address and officiated the event. 31st Asia-Pacific Roundtable

22-24 May 2017, Hilton Kuala Lumpur

The Asia-Pacific Roundtable (APR) is a project of the ASEAN Institutes of Strategic and International Studies (ASEAN-ISIS), with ISIS Malaysia as the anchor institution for convening the conference. This year's roundtable, titled "The Future of the Asia Pacific: Issues and Institutions in Flux", saw the attendance of over 260 scholars, government officials, policy makers and opinion leaders from across the Americas, Asia Pacific, Europe and West Asia.

The 31st APR was officially opened by The Hon Dato' Sri Hajah Nancy Shukri, Minister in the Prime Minister's Department on behalf of The Hon Dato' Sri Mohd Najib Tun Abdul Razak, Prime Minister of Malaysia, at the Welcoming Dinner on 22nd May. The keynote address outlined ASEAN's progress and many achievements despite its constraints and challenges, and how Malaysia has also charted successful courses through issues and institutions in flux. Malaysia's steadfast, reliable and open foreign policy has contributed to the progress of the nation through cooperation with friends and partners in the region and beyond.

There were six plenary and four concurrent sessions, and a special session entitled "Asian Views on America's Role in Asia". Discussions in the plenary sessions addressed "new" major power relations and dynamics in the Asia Pacific; changes in ASEAN; tensions in cyber space in terms of balancing national security, privacy and innovation; economic cooperation in the Asia Pacific; military modernisation in the Asia Pacific; and nationalist, anti-globalisation and anti-establishment politics. The concurrent sessions focused on regional strategic updates – Southeast Asia and Oceania; Northeast Asia; managing challenges and expectations in the Mekong River; and irregular migration.

Some of the high-level role players include Amb Yoshiji Nogami, President, Japan Institute of International Affairs; Amb Bilahari Kausikan, Ambassador-at-Large, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Singapore; Prof Yoon Young-Kwan, Former Foreign Minister, Republic of Korea; Amb Andrew Goledzinowski, Ambassador for People Smuggling and Human Trafficking, Australia; Amb Pinak Ranjan Chakravarty, Distinguished Fellow, Observer Research Foundation, India; Dr James Jay Carafano, Vice President, Foreign and Defense Policy Studies, The Heritage Foundation, USA; Dr Sergey Karaganov, Honorary Chairman of the Presidium, Council on Foreign and Defense Policy, Russia; Dr Rafal Rohozinski, Principal and CEO, The SecDev Group, Canada; Ms Mihoko Matsubara, Chief Security Officer for Japan, Palo Alto Networks, Japan; and Ms Kaja Ciglic, Director, Government Cybersecurity Policy and Strategy, Microsoft Corporation.

The 31st APR was successfully convened with the partnership of four sponsors and seven other supporters. New Straits Times Press Berhad, Berita Harian and Bernama were the official media partners.





Sustainable Development in Malaysia?



► RESEARCH ACTIVITIES

This section lists the research output of ISIS Malaysia — projects, published works, presentations and media engagements.

PROJECTS

The Institute routinely undertakes research and consultancy projects at any one time. Some of the projects, which started in the previous year, were continued in 2017.

Granting Refugees Permission to Work from the Perspectives of Malaysia's National Interest and National Security

The study sought to determine whether granting refugees and asylum seekers permission to work, through their registration in a national database, was a feasible solution to managing the refugee problem in Malaysia. It aimed to explore the risks and benefits of granting refugees and asylum seekers permission to work from the perspectives of Malaysia's national interest and national security. The study concluded that, on balance, the Government should consider regularising registered refugees and asylum seekers and granting them permission to work.

The study for the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR) Malaysia began in August 2016, and the Final Draft was submitted in April 2017.

Innovation and Productivity in Malaysia

The research paper, commissioned by the World Bank group, aimed to serve as the background paper for a study on Malaysian productivity. The paper focused on investigating innovation in Malaysia, including the progress, challenges faced, related policies and supporting institutions. The project kicked-off in December 2016 and was finalised in April 2017.

Addressing Challenges and Identifying Opportunities for Refugee Access to Employment in Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand

The report was commissioned to outline government concerns and advocacy opportunities relating to refugee employment access in Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand. ISIS Malaysia was chosen to undertake research in Malaysia on economic and national security considerations, community perceptions, relevant demographic and societal considerations, regional and international commitments, as well as advocacy considerations. Additional work – in terms of research, data collection and evidence-building – needed to contribute to advocacy efforts on refugee access to employment in Malaysia was also explored.

The study for the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR) Regional Office in Bangkok began in June 2017, and the Final Draft was submitted in November 2017.


SCHEMA Workshop on Urban Food Systems and Health

ISIS Malaysia was invited as a participant to the SCHEMA workshop on Urban Food Systems and Health. SCHEMA is led by the United Nations University's International Institute for Global Health (UNU-IIGH) and Cardiff University's Sustainable Places Research Institute, with support from associate partners UKM-LESTARI, the Penang Institute, and Ark22. It is supported by the Newton-Ungku Omar Fund, co-sponsored by the British Council and the Malaysian Industry-Government Group for High Technology (MiGHT).

The workshop was conducted to examine the urban food systems in Malaysian cities. On 4 December 2017, a paper was presented by ISIS Malaysia. As an ongoing collaboration, ISIS Malaysia will be asked to complete surveys before and after the workshop, and follow-up with queries for a period of six months. The end goal of the collaboration is to improve decision-making for urban health and sustainability by catalysing the application of systems and place-based methods to complex urban problems. The entire timeline of this project will stretch from December 2017 till June 2018.

National Interest Analysis on the Belt and Road Initiative

Research staff embarked on a study to conduct a National Interest Analysis (NIA) of Malaysia's participation in the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) in September 2017. The NIA is not a mere assemblage of information or personal opinions, but critically researched, evaluated and debated to reach robust objective conclusions. It will address the themes and live concerns that are being discussed by the public arena. Malaysia's national interest is defined as the policies, action and conditions needed for the nation's wellbeing in the following spheres: (i) political, diplomatic and security; (ii) economic, business, trade and investment; and (iii) social and cultural. As a result of the NIA, policy makers and the public will be informed in a clear and concise manner about the key policy benefits, costs and risks arising from Malaysia's participation in the BRI.






ISIS Malaysia Delegation to Beijing and Xi'an, 3-9 September 2017






